


OUR HISTORY

October 13, 2018

The Emerging God Image

Presented by: Lionel Corbet, M.D.

St. Barbara Room, The Casa Franciscan Renewal Center

In this workshop, Lionel Corbet, M.D. suggests that a new image of God, or a new way to relate to the transpersonal dimension of reality, is emerging.

Morning Session: 9:30 am - 12:00 pm

This session will address Jung's notion of the Self and contrast it with the Judeo-Christian ways of thinking about the divine. The Self experienced as the divine emerges through image, symbol, dreams and imagination, in contrast to the Judeo-Christian tradition.

Afternoon Session: 1:00 pm - 3:30 pm

Jung's Red Book will be the topic of conversation and will be explored as a religious text. Jung's creation of the Red Book resulted from many years of inner spiritual exploration and from what he termed as his "encounter with the unconscious."

December 8, 2018

Self-Exile and the Soul

Presented by: David Solem, MSW, MAPC, MA

In this workshop we will look at the archetypal energies of Exile both as a result of trauma and also as an autonomous happening in the psyche that can be either the beginning of the individuation journey, or, it may lead to ways of adaptation that make spiritual wholeness impossible.

Morning Session: 9:30 am - 12:00 pm

The group will come to understand the nature of the exile process, and through experimentation come to understand their own internal exile complex and how it may connect to both personal and cultural narratives.

Afternoon Session: 1:00 pm - 3:30 pm

Experiential exercises and group participation in fairy tales will enable the complex to be experienced and discussed on a deeper level. The afternoon promises to deepen the personal and group experience created from the morning session.

January 12, 2019

Missing Fathers

Presented by: Susan Schwartz, Ph.D

This presentation uses the stories of Jung's experiences and dreams with his father to illustrate aspects of the father complex. Additionally, from the literature of Kafka, Hasidic tales and other myths showing betrayal we explore the need for the good father psychologically.

Morning Session: 9:30 am - 12:00 pm

In this workshop, we will come to understand that without the father's presence, he becomes larger than life —an archetype as huge — overriding development and squashing initiative for many.

Afternoon Session: 1:00 pm - 3:30 pm

The fairytale journey is a way into the psyche. This is in the classical Jungian style that details personal pathways and collective avenues. The afternoon discussion (that ensues) is always interesting and thought provoking in reflecting the complexity of the psyche and encouraging us to go deeper into what we know and also have yet to discover.

March 2, 2019

Jung and Shakespeare

Presented by: Susan Rowland, Ph.D

Ten years after the Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams were to be found in...Stratford upon Avon, England, looking for America's cultural founding father, William Shakespeare! For the next 150 years, Shakespeare would be the most performed author, popular amongst pioneers, cowboys, city slickers and politicians.

Morning Session: 9:30 am - 12:00 pm

This session will explore the dreams of the "new" world brought to these shores in plays and rehearsed in performances and readings over the decades. Jung believed that some literature can compensate for cultural bias and/or predict the future.

Afternoon Session: 1:00 pm - 3:30 pm

Shakespeare like Jung expresses deep creation myths bound up with so called feminine and masculine modes of being. After exploring these large frameworks in both authors we will look at practical examples of comedy and tragedy as psychic forms of personal transformation.

April 6, 2019

Game of Thrones

Game of Thrones has captured the imagination of enormous numbers of people in a profound way. In this talk we will examine some of the archetypal underpinnings of the show's characters that we love to hate and hate to love within a contemporary context.

Morning Session: 9:30 am - 12:00 pm

This session will introduce the show and the complex nature of the narrative as the show's main characters will be introduced. Basic Jungian concepts and definitions will be discussed, such as archetypes, complexes, shadow, ego, anima and animus.

Afternoon Session: 1:00 pm - 3:30 pm

An extension of the morning session with a broadening and deepening of the show's structure and form unfolding. Jungian concepts such as the "disowned feminine," and "otherness" will be explored as important inner psychological processes which are projected onto the outer world from within the characters on the show.

May 18, 2019

The Hag & the Anima Mundi

This presentation will present a metaphorical approach to trauma using mythology and the Grail Legend materials, and Jungian concepts. "once upon a time...and a long time ago...the Grail legends relied heavily upon the allegorical gore and tales of "the Hag", she who induces shame and fear...sometimes known as the Hideous Damsel, Dame Ragnell, Cundrie, or the Lady on the Mule.

Morning Session: 9:30 am - 12:00 pm

This session will begin with a discussion of the importance of myths and fairytales as an expression of the collective unconscious, and what this tells us about human development.

Afternoon Session: 1:00 pm - 3:30 pm

Additional material is utilized in discussing the Hag as she appears in various forms. Open participation is welcomed as the Hag is told through alchemical narratives and myths emboldened by the speaker's experience in working with Joseph Campbell.
