#### JOB TITLE: RESEARCH FELLOW

**JOB PURPOSE**: To be an active member of the AHRC-funded research project 'Performing Restoration Shakespeare', assisting the Principal Investigator (Prof Richard Schoch, Queen's University Belfast) and the International Co-Investigator (Prof Amanda Eubanks Winkler, Syracuse University, USA) in the planning, delivery and evaluation of research and impact activities.

#### MAIN ACTIVITIES/RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Assist the project Principal Investigator and Co-Investigator in planning, delivering and evaluating the project's research and impact activities, ranging from archival study to scholar-artist workshops to production and curation of digital resources.
- Liaise with project partners (Shakespeare's Globe [London], Folger Shakespeare Library [Washington, DC], and Shakespeare Birthplace Trust [Stratford-upon-Avon]) in delivering on-site research and impact events.
- Serve on the Project Management Team, participating in regular meetings to advance project goals, including liaison with project partners and External Advisory Board.
- Carry out analysis and critical evaluation of continuing project activities with both researchers and research users in London, Stratford-upon-Avon and Washington, DC. (Research users include arts administrators, performing artists, and audiences for theatre and music).
- Promote and publicize project events through social media, print, and other channels as appropriate, and in conjunction with project partners.
- Oversee development of project website, including selection and editing of content (eg, rehearsal videos, audience interviews)
- Curate the project's video and digital components, in conjunction with the technical partner Blue Land Media in Washington, DC.
- Assist PI and Co-I in the preparation of published research (e.g., co-editing a collection of essays)
- Prepare her/his own material for publication in national and international journals and presentations at national and international conferences, including practice-based research as appropriate.
- Present regular progress reports on research to members of the research group and to external audiences in order to disseminate and publicise research findings.
- Carry out administrative tasks associated with the research project to ensure that the project is completed on time and within budget. These might include organisation of project meetings, workshops and summer school events; preparation of project documents (eg, audience enrichment resources); logistical coordination for workshop participants, project evaluation; financial control; risk assessment of research activities; and liaison with collaborating nonacademic institutions.
- Keep abreast of developments in the post holder's own specialism and related disciplines.

- Plan for specific aspects of the research programme (timescales range from 1-30 months in advance) and contribute to research group planning.

# **Further Particulars**

Queen's University Belfast seeks to appoint a Research Fellow to work full-time for 36 months on the AHRC-funded project 'Performing Restoration Shakespeare', led by Prof Richard Schoch (School of Arts, English and Languages, Queen's University Belfast) and Prof Amanda Eubanks Winkler (Department of Art and Music Histories, Syracuse University, USA). Prof Schoch is a theatre historian specializing in the history of Shakespeare on the English stage and Prof Eubanks Winkler is a musicologist specializing in English theatre music of the 17th and 18th centuries.

'Performing Restoration Shakespeare' is an interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary research project that unites scholars and practitioners in theatre and music to investigate (i) how and why Restoration adaptations of Shakespeare succeeded in performance in their own time (i.e., 1660-1714) and (ii) how and why they can succeed in performance today. Integrating theoretical and practical approaches, the project advances debates in theatre studies and musicology by proposing new methods for studying historical performance.

The project seeks to enhance academic, artistic and public understanding of Restoration Shakespeare. Academics and artists will collaborate in research-led creative practice that results in scholarly publication and public performances. Academics will create new methods for investigating historical performances. Artists and arts organizations will expand their repertoires by performing Restoration Shakespeare. The general public will gain insight into how Shakespeare's plays have been staged in different ways at different times.

Main project activities will be run on-site in partnership with The Folger Shakespeare Library (Washington, DC), Shakespeare's Globe (London), and The Shakespeare Birthplace Trust (Stratford-upon-Avon):

2017: Workshop on *The Tempest* at Shakespeare's Globe, involving scholars, artists and the public.

2018: Scholar-artist workshop on *Macbeth* at the Folger Shakespeare Library, culminating in a professional production. The production will be recorded and the creative process will be documented in videos.

2019: Restoration Shakespeare summer school at The Shakespeare Birthplace Trust, with participants from UK theatre and music organizations

This project offers the Research Fellow a rich variety of training and development opportunities to: (1) collaborate with international scholars; (2) collaborate with world-class artists; (3) build relationships with prominent non-academic partners; (4) engage with research end users; (5) contribute to and co-edit a volume of essays; (6) prepare and publish her/his own research; and (7) gain transferable skills in collaborative and practice-based research, editing, project management, event planning, web design, video curating and public engagement. Having developed a broad international network in academia, performing arts and the non-profit sector, the Research Fellow will be able, at the conclusion of the project, to pursue diverse career paths.
